Safety First!

It's now fall, the nights are getting cooler, and leaves starting to change. For most of us who look forward to winter, our minds are dreaming of deep powder, carving, and steep mountain ascents. Preseason maintenance should be a priority for all and with that we should take the time to look over our backcountry gear as well. Below is a list of things we need to look over before our first trip to the trailhead.

Avalanche gear:

Beacon check-If your beacon is more than 5 years old I would strongly suggest upgrading for the sake of your life and the others you ride with (note: original BCA Tracker, Ortovox F1/M1, older Pieps or anything analog are grossly outdated and need to be retired). Hopefully, by now you have purchased a DIGITAL 3 antennae beacon and took the batteries out over the summer to prevent corrosion. Insert fresh alkaline batteries and check both the send and receive modes of the unit. Double check the directional arrow is working properly. The last thing we want is to get to the trail head for the first time of the year and have a broken piece of gear. A brand new beacon can malfunction out of the box, while one drop to the floor can also render a beacon useless.

Shovel-A quality metal blade shovel designed for avalanche rescue is a key tool for a successful recovery. Also a necessary piece of equipment to get our machines unstuck, they take a beating throughout the year. Look over your shovel for dents, cracks, broken welds etc. Extend the handle and make sure the spring loaded keepers are working properly. Consider carrying two shovels, one on your back for avalanche rescue and one on your sled/bike for getting unstuck. Taking your pack off in ANY terrain separates you from your life saving gear.

Avalanche Probe- Deploy your probe to check the locking function; if your probe uses a string to lock it together, or is less than 240 CM long it is time to upgrade. The likelihood of a successful recovery of a deep burial scenario is becoming more likely with the faster, more accurate beacons. Probes fewer than 240CM are not long enough.

Avalanche Airbag-The technology in this quickly growing segment has come a long way in a short amount of time. If you are using one, GREAT! If not, you should be thinking of purchasing one. If you are not familiar with the airbag principle, basically if a person is caught in an Avalanche, they deploy the airbag using a trigger pulled on the shoulder strap.

This inflates an airbag behind your head to increase your displacement and help bring you to the surface of the slide. Used bags are very reasonably priced if you cannot afford a new one. Several companies are offering used bag trade-in programs and typically resell these for minimal profit to allow more people to get into the necessary safety gear.

Emergency gear-Go through your packs and restock items you may have used last season; First aid kits, medications, batteries etc. Open up your tool kits (hopefully they are not full of rust) and spray everything down with a light coat of WD40. Check over your survival gear and note anything that may have expired or needs to be replaced. NOW is the time to find out if something is missing or broken.

Machine-Proper preseason maintenance will decrease your likelihood of a breakdown or failure in the backcountry. Look over belts, hoses (check hoseclamps), track, hyfax, carbides, etc. to make sure everything is in good shape. Powervalves should be cleaned, chaincase oil changed, and inspect drive bearings. Chains/sprockets on snowbikes should be inspected often and/or replaced annually to ensure no failures. Whatever your ride, put a wrench on all nuts and bolts to make sure nothing has come loose while you were pounding down the South Fork road at the end of the season.

I have compiled a list of Motorized specific avalanche classes being offered this year. If you have not attended any avalanche training or maybe it has been a few years, we are structuring the curriculum to better inform you about motorized specific travel procedures and techniques. Please consider attending one or more of the following to ensure you and your riding group is prepared for a successful rescue if needed.

<u>Motorized Avalanche Awareness -</u> Thursday, Dec. 19, at Penco-this is a short program (1.5-2 hrs) designed to bring to light the need for further training. We cover where to find the avalanche forecast, how to read it and what it means, and basic introduction into avalanche terminology.

<u>Motorized Intro to Avalanches -</u> Thursday, Jan 16 and Saturday, Jan 18, at FVCC/in Fieldthis class is designed to dive into what causes avalanches and how to avoid them. We will go through rescue scenarios in the field and teach you how to practice with your equipment. <u>Motorized L1 with Mike Duffy -</u> Friday, Jan 24 through Sunday, Jan 26, 2020, location TBD-Mike is a world renowned avalanche instructor with a long list of accolades. His classes are entertaining and very informational. Using previous avalanche incidents, he will go through what each group did right, what they did wrong, and demonstrate ways to mitigate risk while riding. <u>Motorized L1 with FOFAC at FVCC and in the field.</u> Date March 6-8- This class is similar curriculum to Mike Duffy's class. Local forecasters and myself will teach current material, techniques and train you on avalanche rescue.

* Everyone who rides in the backcountry should be AT LEAST Level 1 certified. *PLEASE* get your riding buddies together and attend one or all of these great offerings this year. As always, if you have any comments, suggestions, ideas, or concerns don't hesitate to get ahold


